The Parent-Teachers' Associations at the different schools have given splendid support in furnishing material and equipment for the improvement of the buildings and the comfort of the children.

The school directors are deserving of much credit for the interest they have taken in the care of school property.

To keep buildings, public or private, in good repair is a matter of good business judgment and will save money in the end.

I want to express my sincere appreciation of the cooperation and interest in the welfare of the schools that has been manifested by citizens, directors, teachers and pupils during the past year.

This is the spirit that trains the young people for the best kind of citizenship.
