I am pleased to submit my ninth annual report of the schools of Clarendon.

Seven schools are being maintained during the present school year.

It will be noticed that the record of attendance, as given above, is rather exceptional and worthy of the highest commendation.

It indicates an excellent spirit of cooperation between parents and teachers.

Considerable work has been done in grading and repairs at the Springs school under the direction of Mrs. Bert Johnson.

This was very necessary for the protection of the property, and more work will need to be done in the near future.

The toilets at the Chippenhook school should be repaired or new ones installed. It would also be economy to have this building painted during next summer.

It would seem wise, for the present, to delay enlarging school facilities at North Clarendon. It is difficult to prophesy just now what the situation may be there in a year or two. The present enrollment can be cared for until it is determined by sound judgment what is best to be done.

The Parent-Teachers' Associations at the different schools have given splendid support in furnishing material and equipment for the improvement of the buildings and the comfort of the children.

The school directors are deserving of much credit for the interest they have taken in the care of school property.

To keep buildings, public or private, in good repair is a matter of good business judgment and will save money in the end.

I want to express my sincere appreciation of the cooperation and interest in the welfare of the schools that has been manifested by citizens, directors, teachers and pupils during the past year.

This is the spirit that trains the young people for the best kind of citizenship.
